The forces under the direction of Engineer Moore, Superintendent Robinson, and former Superintendent Russell completed the work of exploring the entries and rooms of the Klondike district of the Rolling Mill Mine at 10 o'clock this morning, and there is every reason to believe that the total loss of life is now known.

The work of rescue never for a moment lagged from the instant that Foremen Rodgers and Blanch and Fire-Bosses Whitney, Griffith, Foster, and Retallick felt the shock of the explosion until every nook and corner of the devious ways of the Klondike workings had been searched by experienced miners. That hundreds of miners working in other portions of the mine are to-day alive is due to the energetic efforts of the executive staff of the Mill Mine

is not completed and will not be completed for some time.

The funeral services from impressive throngs of men, women, and children. The coffins filled the church and extended steps into the street. Women wept and wailed and stood long rows of absolute grief, their heads bowed, and in gleaming a light reflecting the faces of the dead. The coffins, two wagons were taken out to and interred in the cemetery belonging to St. Stephen's Church.

The third batch of bodies came up at 4 o'clock this afternoon, having been taken from the cable line. They had been lying a few hours before they were taken up by a W. H. Morris, of Boswell, and Crocker, of Potts place, Geeson's assistant, who had come short on hearing of the disaster.

The men fought their way through the full length of the tunnel where the explosion occurred. Right to where the bodies lay, the condition of the bodies was great deal worse than either lists referred to, with the exception of the poor fellow who was blown off and tho right arm badly mutilated.

A lot of scorched mules were found in this vicinity and the exploring party saw the animals from the smell of the smoke, but that a few of the men were found in the room, while present when they found them, sick from the stench, had all the bodies were removed and it is feared that several may not be identified.

Mr. Morris says he is positive that all the bodies have been recovered from the Klondike district, with the exception of a few that managed to get into some of the old places in order to get away from
